





Social ethics in Scripture


- · Social ethics are a major issue in the Bible.
- The attention is on the dynamics within the covenant (faith) community, not outside it.

Jesus casts the money changers out of the JEWISH TEMPLE, not the gladiators out of the ROMAN ARENA.

Peter commands Christian slaves to submit to "perverse" masters (1 Pet.2:18), not to demand their freedom.

The Epistles address the church not the state.

- The Old Covenant has a different emphasis from the New.
 - The O.C. unites church and state.
 - The O.C. defines "wealth" in material terms.
 - The O.C. defines "hope" in temporal terms.
- Social Justice activists tend to ground their message in the O.C. Scriptures.
- N.C. social justice calls for a renewed Christian community that mocks this world's false hope, while modeling sensitivity to the dignity of humanity.



As an opportunity for ministry be a responsible steward.

What does the N.T. teach us about Worldly Wealth

As a dangerous deception don't let it be our security or identity.

As a desensitizer to God and people, don't let it keep us from hearing and seeing.



The Shame of a Wealth Gap

- A large gap between the "havenots" and "have-lots" should shame a healthy society.

If U.S. land were divided like U.S. wealth



The challenge for a "free society" is to produce a just distribution of goods & services without penalizing freedom and productivity.


Like Jesus we need to hear the cry of the poor.

The problem with the 40% in the red dot is that their lack of wealth is too often linked to a lack of dignity, access to goods / services, influence, and opportunity.

The biggest worry with concentration of wealth is that the 1% will buy themselves favors from government.



- 1. Get the facts wealth distribution.
- 2. Step outside your comfort zone - Durham Rescue Mission, Soup Kitchen, etc.
- 3. Grow antenna listening to those who feel left out, passed over, etc.
- 4. Listen to the "have-nots" in your social circle.



Miracles are SIGNS not solutions.

Materialism is being preoccupied with material goods and circumstances as "the root of" and "the **solution to**" the human dilemma.

Marxism, Buddhism, Capitalism

The needs of the "have-nots" are complex.

Material deprivation

 not able to access key basic goods and services.



Political marginalization - excluded from positions of public dignity, power, and respect.

Natural misfortune - difficult circumstances beyond our control. Family disintegration - not supported by a healthy family foundation.



Concern #4. Kingdom Priorities


 Use things to show God's love for people, not vice versa.
