



1. God's image is in all humans.

Acts 17

"26 and He made from one, every nation of mankind ... 27 that they should seek God, if perhaps they might grope for Him and find Him, though He is not far from each one of us; 28 for in Him we live and move and exist, as even some of your own poets have said, 'For we also are His offspring."

Our "spiritual antennae" is tuned to God's station, but we tend to change the channel.

The Hierarchy of human needs **Transcendence** distinguishes Self actualization us as made - Cognitive / Aesthetic in the image of God. Abraham Maslow Esteem needs ocially oriented respect from others Belonging needs - social security Safety needs - material security for the future Biological needs - food & shelter

God's image in us includes:

Antennae - ability to connect with God. Appetite - a longing for life and peace.

Faith - commitment to presuppositions that are unseen but necessary for a worldview.

Reason - a mental ability to make sense of data in life.

Conscience - an inner sense of right & wrong. Responsibility - an inner sense duty & ability.

2. God's image in creation gives us clues.

Romans 1

"19 because that which is known about God is **evident within them**; for God made it **evident to them**. 20 For since the creation of the world His invisible attributes, His eternal power and divine nature, **have been clearly seen**, **being understood through what has been made**, so that they are **without excuse**. ... 25 For **they exchanged** the truth of God for a lie, and worshiped and served the creature rather than the Creator,"

- 2. God's image in creation gives us clues.
- √ The universe had an origin.
- √ The universe is ordered.
- √ The universe is designed for life.
- √ The universe is seen as beautiful.
- √ We have a moral / spiritual sense.

The creation is not worthy of worship, but it points us to the Creator. who is worthy of worship.

For many the creation is like a cut-flower

> where we embrace its glory and beauty

while denying its root basis.

3. God's image in Christ reveals God in living color.

Colossians 1

"There was the true light which, coming into the world, enlightens every man."


Jesus reveals the nature of both God and man.

Proofs come with Context and Commitment.

"The power of words come in their storvline, (context, narrative)."

Tim Keller's clues for the existence of God:

- 1. The existence of the universe that is "Cosmos" not "Chaos" suggests a Creator. (Cosmological Argument)
- 2. The conditions necessary for life are so precise that they suggest intentional design. (Teleological Argument)
- 3. Objective moral values exist and require a moral lawgiver. (Moral Argument)
- 4. Belief in universal human rights requires a transcendent grounding. (Social Justice Argument)
- The human experience of beauty, love, and meaning suggests something beyond the material world. (Human Longings Argument)
- 6. The resurrection is a historically credible event that validates Jesus' divine identity. (Resurrection Argument)
- 7. The personal experiences of individuals transformed by faith provide practical evidence. (Existential Argument)

- The database they work with.


Science considers (material data only)
