

Challenges to the Christian Faith

2. Is God fair? (the challenge of justice)

Three issues raise questions about God's fairness.

- 1. CONTROL (How much of this life is controlled by God?)
 - Does God's sovereignty mean that all details of life are predestined?
 - 2. ELECTION (Who is chosen?)
 - Does God predestine who can be saved (believe) and who cannot?



3. EXPOSURE (How much must be known?) - What about individuals who

have never heard the Gospel?

Are sovereignty & grace inseparable?

Romans 8

"29 For whom **He foreknew**, **He also predestined** to become conformed to the image of His Son, that He might be the first-born among many brethren; 30 and whom He predestined, these He also called; and whom He called, these He also justified; and whom He justified, these He also glorified."

Romans 9

"15 For He says to Moses, "I will have mercy on whom I have mercy, and I will have compassion on whom I have compassion." 16 So then it does not depend on the man who wills or the man who runs, but on God who has mercy."

Some Christians believe that God's sovereignty is absolute.

"If there is one single molecule in this universe running around loose, totally free of God's sovereignty, then we have no guarantee that a single promise of God will ever be fulfilled."



This view of (absolute) "divine sovereignty" raises questions that suggest a different view should be considered.

R.C. Sproul

If God sovereignly preordains all behavior including human volition -

- Are human ethics just a charade?
- How can God find fault with anyone without condemning Himself?
- In what way are the exhortations & warnings in Scripture meaningful?
- Is human free choice an illusion?
- In what sense can we speak of a personal relationship with God?

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Is the God we worship too small?


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Is God's will / plan synced with His CREATIVE WISDOM?

Whose Line is it Anyway?



An infinitely creative
God can make all things
work together to fulfill
His purpose, without
micromanaging.



If God is infinitely knowledgeable, wise, creative, and powerful we should not be surprised that He could work all things together (including our free choices, etc.) for His purposes?

Psalm 139

"1 O Lord, You have searched me and known me. 2 You know when I sit down and when I rise up; You understand my thoughts from afar. 3 You scrutinize my path and my lying down, and are intimately acquainted with all my ways. ... 6 Such knowledge is too wonderful for me; it is too high, I cannot attain to it."

But how are we to explain texts that seem to "clearly" indicate that God chooses some to believe and not others.

John 6:44: "No one can come to Me, unless the Father who sent Me draws him," "My sheep hear my voice, and I know them, and they follow me;" John 10:27

Old Testament believers would recognize Jesus as the Christ when they saw him.

Acts 13:48 "all who were **appointed** for eternal life believed"

The Greek word translated as "appointed" has the idea of "ordained or disposed" with no explanation of how or by whom.

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Eph.1:4 "just as He chose **us in (not for or by, but through) him** before the foundation of the world"

Israel was elect (chosen by God) "Thus says the Lord, Israel is My son," Ex.4:22

"the Lord your **God has chosen you (Israel)** to be a people for His own possession." *Deut.* 7:6

Jesus, like true Israel, was the focus of election. (Isa.42:1, 49:7, Lk.9:35, 23:35, Matt.12:18, 1Pet.2:4,6)

"Now the promises were spoken to Abraham and to his seed. He does not say, "and to seeds," as referring to many, but rather to one, "and to your seed," that is, Christ." Gal. 3:16, Matt.2:15

It is possible that all believers are elect (chosen) not TO believe but BY their faith IN HIM who is the chosen one? Romans 8:30 "and whom He predestined, these He also called;"

Romans 9 "16 So then it does not depend on the man who wills or the man who runs, but on God who has mercy."

The context of Rom.9-11 is the inclusion of Gentiles in the promises made to Israel. Individuals - (Jacob & Esau in vs.10-18) represent Israel & Gentile (Mal.1:2-5).

Romans 9:8 "That is, it is not the children of the flesh who are children of God, but the children of the promise are regarded as descendants."

God's sovereignty can be understood, NOT as micro management, but macro management through the choice of Israel / Jesus by a God who has infinite creativity, knowledge, & power.

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Reconciliation was completed by Christ's sacrifice without man's faith.

2 Corinthians 5:18-19

"All this is from God, who **reconciled** us to himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation, that God **was reconciling** the world to himself in Christ, not counting men's sins against them."

Christ's sacrifice is the basis of salvation.

But could it be available to some who have not known him or expressed faith in him?

Christ's atonement is limited.

- Not everyone will be saved.
- Only those who believe will be saved.
- But was Christ's work at the Cross limited in its intent or only in its reception?

Calvinists emphasize that the redemption was FINISHED at the Cross.

Faith is a gift from God to "the elect" who were predestined to believe before they were born.

Were the elect saved before they believed?

Arminians emphasize that the redemption was only FURNISHED at the Cross.

Man has freedom to respond to the Gospel by the common grace bestowed on all who bear God's image.

Are we saved by faith?

What is the nature of "saving faith"?.

All Evangelicals DO NOT agree

as to how saving faith is recognized or how God's grace is ultimately received.

Luke 23

"33...they crucified Him and the criminals, one on the right and the other on the left. 34 But Jesus was saying, "Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing." And they cast lots, dividing up His garments among themselves."

Acts 10

"34...God is not one to show partiality, 35 but in every nation the man who **fears Him and does** what is right, is welcome to Him."



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Hebrews 11:6

"And without faith it is impossible to please Him, for he who comes to God must believe that He is, and that He is a rewarder of those who seek Him."

Could it be that we are to preach the Gospel message not only to enlighten the mind but also to expose the heart?

1 Samuel 16:7

"God sees not as man sees, for man looks at the outward appearance, **but the Lord looks at the heart**."

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Could God's grace be broader than what we have thought?

- 1. The revelation that we have, clearly indicates that a confession of faith in Christ as Savior, brings a CLEAR understanding of our hope.
- 2. This is the GOSPEL we are called to proclaim.

NOTE:

The inclusion of Gentiles in God's plan was UNCLEAR to Old Testament Israel, and so was the identity of JESUS as the CHRIST.

Spiritual people who did not KNOW JESUS?

- Holy Pagans Job, Abimelech (king of Gerar -Gen.20:1-18), Jethro (a priest of Midian - Ex.18:1-12),
- Jews who lived before Jesus was born Abraham.
- The people of Nineveh (Jonah).
- Abel, Enoch, Noah, being neither Jews nor Christians, pleased God because they sought Him with the faith response which pleases Him (Heb.11:6)
- Melchizedek (a mysterious Canaanite priest) Gen.14:17-24, Heb.6:20-7:22.
- The Magi (wise men) Matt.2:1-12
 - Matthew 10:15; 11:22; 12:41-42 the Ninevites, the queen of Sheba, the inhabitants of Tyre and Sidon, Sodom and Gomorrah.
