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COMMUNITY does not mean full CLARITY!

1 Corinthians 13

"11 When I was a child, I used to speak as a child, think as a child, reason as a child; when I became a man, I did away with childish things. 12 For now we see in a mirror dimly, but then face to face; now I know in part, but then I will know fully just as it also have been fully known. 13 But now faith, hope, love, abide these three; but the greatest of these is love."

Some things will be UNCLEAR. Faith, hope, & love should be CLEAR.

But what if "faith, hope, & love" are not clear



Are divisions sometimes necessary?

1 Corinthians 11

"17 But in giving this instruction, I do not praise you, because you come together not for the better but for the worse. 18 For, in the first place, when you come together as a church, I hear that divisions exist among you; and in part, I believe it. 19 For there must also be factions among you, in order that those who are approved may have become evident among you. 20 Therefore when you meet together, it is not to eat the Lord's Supper, 21 for in your eating each one takes his own supper first; and one is hungry and another is drunk."

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When the Corinthian church came together their behavior revealed that they were not really together.

They were a culture of class systems.






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Acts 15

How are we to understand the relationship of the Old Covenant (O.C.) to the New Covenant (N.C.)?





What led to the Protestant Reformation?

- CARNALITY within the church magisterium nepotism, immorality, sale of indulgences, baseless traditions, mariolatry, etc.
- CORRUPTION of the Gospel message salvation by faith + sacraments, good works etc.
- CRITICAL thinking from the Enlightenment (Renaissance)
- CONTACT with the Apostolic writings not limited to Latin, and the interpretation of a magisterium.
 - Printing press made public access possible.
 - Greek & Hebrew manuscripts were made available.

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CULTURAL enlightenment - critical thinking by all.


The Roman Catholic counter reformation.

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- · Luther wanted to correct the church, not leave it.
- The Catholic church made reforms (Council of Trent) ending the sale of indulgences, demanded better preparation for and conduct from its leaders, etc.
- It expanded the Cannon including books that were written later and supportive of Catholic tradition.
- It clarified the relationship between faith and works in ways that were not that different from some protestants.
- Grace through faith is primary but not without works.
- Gal.5:6, Jas.2:24, Phil.2:12, ...

"If anyone says that by faith alone the impious is justified ... **let him be anathema.**" (Canon 9, Decree on Justification)


Positional truth

- √ It is a decree & not a felt experience.
- √ It is not progressive but complete.
- √ It is not related to human merit.
- √ It is not conditioned on moral reform.
- √ It fully satisfies the demands of a perfectly holy God.
- √ It must be learned through teaching & received by faith.

Why Positional truth is important

- ✓ It is clearly illustrated in both the Old and New Testaments.
- ✓ It is at the heart of the Gospel.
- ✓ It puts the attention on what God has done in Christ not on what we must do.





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Concerns with Positional truth

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- √ It is not relational, personal, or felt.
- √ It permits moral irresponsibility.
- ✓ It places all the emphasis on legal justification.

If you get a scholarship to play ball, you can't expect to skip class and practice, and at the end pick up a diploma and the trophy.



The BOOKS (of human works) and the BOOK OF LIFE

Revelation 20

"11 And I saw a great white throne,...12 And I saw the dead, small and great, stand before God; and **the books** were opened:

and another book was opened, which is the book of life;

and the dead were judged from the things which were written in **the books**, according to their deeds. And death and Hades were thrown into the lake of fire. This is the second death,

15 and if anyone's name was not **found written in the book of life,** he was thrown into the lake of fire."

The "better promises" of the New Covenant are justification by faith through the work of Christ FOR us, not IN or THROUGH us.

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When the Bible speaks of the final judgment it is almost always on the basis of our works, not our faith.
