

Why are Evangelical Christians so politically stressed when God is not?



The Scripture has more to say about social reform than it does about heaven and hell together.

But what it says is hard to hear & often ignored or misapplied.

It gives a very clear model of God's form of human government - BUT?

Its responsibility to the church is clear enough, but also shocking and misunderstood.

The disciples were called to spread the gospel to all humanity.

Matthew 28

"19 Go therefore and make disciples of **all the nations**, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, 20 teaching them to observe all that I commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age."

Mark 16:15

"Going into the world and preach the gospel to all creation."

Luke 24:47

"repentance for forgiveness of sins would be proclaimed in his name to **all the nations**,"

It is taking our baptism seriously

Submission -

with faith / obedience to the Word & Way of the Cross

Expectation -

of serenity, security, and significance through Christ, not the world

Power -

to show & tell the gospel in the midst of suffering

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We show God's power through our weakness.

1 Peter 2

"13 **Submit yourselves for the Lord's sake to every human institution**, whether to a king as the one in authority, 14 or to governors as sent by him for the punishment of evildoers and the praise of those who do right. 15 For such is the will of God that by doing right you may silence the ignorance of foolish men. 16 *Act* as free men, and **do not use your freedom as a covering** for evil, but *use it* as bondslaves of God. 17 Honor all people, love the brotherhood, fear God, honor the king."

We are peacemakers who give up our freedom and fortune out of love for others, just as Jesus did.



Philippians 2

"5 Have this attitude in yourselves which was also in Christ Jesus, 6 who, although He existed in the form of God, did not regard equality with God a thing to be grasped, 7 but emptied Himself, taking the form of a bond-servant, and being made in the likeness of men. 8 And being found in appearance as a man, He humbled Himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross."



This is the Way of the Cross marking Jesus' followers' and the Gospel's message.

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We are free to yield our rights for the sake of peace because we are citizens of a higher Kingdom?

Matthew 17

When Peter was asked if Jesus paid the Temple Tax "25 He said, "Yes." And when he came into the house, Jesus spoke to him first, saying, "What do you think, Simon? From whom do the kings of the earth collect customs or poll-tax, from their sons or from strangers?" 26 And upon his saying, "From strangers," Jesus said to him, "Consequently the sons are exempt. 27 But, lest we give them offense, go to the sea, and throw in a hook, and take the first fish that comes up; and when you open its mouth, you will find a stater. Take that and give it to them for you and Me.""

1 Peter 2:16

"Act as free men, and do not use your freedom as a covering for evil, but use it as bondslaves of God.

"Consider it all joy, my brethren, when you encounter various trials," 1 Peter 3

"15 but sanctify Christ as Lord in your hearts, always being ready to make a defense to everyone who asks you to give an account for the hope that is in you, yet with gentleness and reverence; 16 and keep a good conscience so that in the thing in which you are slandered, those who revile your good behavior in Christ will be put to shame. 17 For it is better, if God should will it so, that you suffer for doing what is right rather than for doing what is wrong."

Sacrificial suffering is a powerful framework for sharing the Gospel's hope but only when met with Jesus' attitude.

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1 Corinthians 1

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"22 For indeed Jews ask for signs, and Greeks search for wisdom; 23 but we preach Christ crucified, to Jews a stumbling block, and to Gentiles foolishness, ... 26 For consider your calling, brethren, that there were not many wise according to the flesh, not many mighty, not many noble; 27 but God has chosen the foolish things of the world to shame the wise, and God has chosen the weak things of the world to shame the things which are strong,"

> God uses our weakness and our difficult circumstances to trigger a response that has resulted in the evangelization of the world.

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This is the Point


We render to God what is God's when we take our baptism seriously,
