
The challenge of

Does it make sense to our physical senses?


The challenge of **suffering**

The Bible reveals the nature and work of God in Christ suffering,






The great symbols of the faith

reminding us of our sharing in Jesus' death and resurrection.

- Christianity is the only religious system that celebrates the death of its founder.
- It also calls for the living sacrifice of its participants.

Death (dying, and suffering) is at the heart of Christianity and it is why we cannot ignore it and must address it.

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
- · James was probably the oldest epistle in the N.T.
- · James reflected the early period of the church (pre-Gentile).
- · James was not widely accepted until the 3rd cent.

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The historical context of James

John 16:33

"32 Behold, an hour is coming, and has already come, for you to be scattered, each to his own home, and to leave Me alone; and yet I am not alone, because the Father is with Me. 33 These things I have spoken to you, that in Me you may have peace. In the world you have tribulation, but take courage; I have overcome the world."





Note what James will NOT say.

- He will not tell us how to AVOID trials.
- · He will not tell us how to OVERCOME trials.
- He will not tell us how to ENDURE trials.
- He will not tell us the **MEANING** of our trials.
- · He will not tell us the SOURCE of our trials.
- He will not tell us that our trials are DECREED by God to teach us something.



So if we are expecting answers to any of these we might be in the wrong class and reading the wrong book.

Facing life's troubles starts with four basic insights.

1. Trials can be a **BLESSING**

Trials can be a BLESSING

James 1

- "1 James, a bond-servant of God and of the Lord Jesus Christ, To the twelve tribes who are dispersed abroad: Greetings.
- ² Consider it all joy, my brethren, when you encounter various trials, ³ knowing that the testing of your faith produces endurance. ⁴ And let endurance have *its* perfect result, so that you may be perfect and complete, lacking in nothing."

Pressure in tribulation
+ perseverance in faith
= power in witness.

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James 1

"1 James, a **bond-servant** of God and of the Lord Jesus Christ, To the twelve tribes who are **dispersed** abroad: Greetings."

Know who we are

Aliens, Sojourners

This world is **not our home** and it is **hostile** to God's kingdom.

Implications

- James was the half brother of Jesus, (Mk.6:3) "James the just", leader of the church in Jerusalem, martyred for his faith. James lived in this world but was a citizen of another kingdom as a voluntary slave to God and His Son.
- James addresses a lot of social ethics issues in a way that is consistent with Jesus, Paul, and Peter (but not politically correct with the world).

Know what to expect

"consider not an emotional impulse"

Our response is based on a **commitment** or "faith claim" linked to a hope found in Scriptural revelation.

How can we do this?

- · Sharpen our perception renew your mind (the way we see).
- Broaden our perspective of this world & God's kingdom.
- Refresh our priorities develop & demonstrate faith / hope.

Romans 12:2

"And do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the **renewing of your mind**, that you may prove what the will of God is, that which is good and acceptable and perfect."

Know what to expect

"iov not endurance"

We are not just to "get through" hard times, we are to "feed our faith" off of them.

How can we do this?

- Consider the company fellowship with Jesus & saints.
- · Imagine your benefits confidence, courage & freedom.
- Fix your hope beyond this life.

Know what to expect

"when not if"

Don't be surprised by bad circumstances.

How can we do this?

- · Plan our response mental dress rehearsal for events.
- · Remember we live in a broken world we can't avoid it.

"various not only persecution"

Trials come in many forms and are not necessarily anointed.

How can we do this?

- · Remember God anoints us not our circumstances.
- Don't try to understand every trial It's our response that is the issue.

"this is an opportunity for faith"


Don't mishandle the opportunity.
