Observations


- These parables share common themes.
 - 1. A treasure of great value
 - 2. A discovery of great joy
 - 3. A purchase of great sacrifice
- There is no interpretation offered.
- These parables appear only in Matthew.

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Observations on Matt.13:44-46

These parables appear only in Matthew.



 This is consistent with the tradition that Matthew was writing largely to the Jewish people.

 The Jewish religion was shaped by the hope of a coming King and kingdom.

Some clues to the meaning

 Matthew introduces the parables in ch.13 as addressing "mysteries of the kingdom".

Matthew 13:11

"To you it has been granted to know the **mysteries** of the kingdom of heaven, but to them it has not been granted."

 Matthew concludes the parables in ch.13 as addressing "things new and old".

Matthew 13:52

"And He said to them, "Therefore every scribe who has become a disciple of the kingdom of heaven is like a head of a household, who brings forth out of his treasure things new and old."

The parables speak of God's posture toward us.

- God sees us as the treasure, and pearl.
- God makes a great sacrifice to purchase us.

1 John 4:19


"We love because he first loved us."
