Matthew 18:21-35 Injustice and forgiveness

Matthew 18

"²¹ Then Peter came and said to Him, "Lord, how often shall my brother sin against me and I forgive him? Up to seven times?" ²² Jesus said to him, "I do not say to you, up to seven times, but up to seventy times seven." "²³ For this reason the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a certain king who wished to settle accounts with his slaves." ² "24 And when he had begun to settle them, there was brought to him one who owed him ten thousand talents. 25 But since he did not have the means to repay, his lord commanded him to be sold, along with his wife and children and all that he had, and repayment to be made. 26 The slave therefore falling down, prostrated himself before him, saying, 'Have patience with me, and I will repay you everything.' 27 And the lord of that slave felt compassion and released him and forgave him the debt." 3

CONTEXT


This parable addresses not the need of the offender but the heart of the offended.

"21 Then Peter came and said to Him, "Lord, how often shall my brother sin against me and I forgive him? Up to seven times?"



We are prepared to respond to offenders only AFTER we have received a pass from a "spiritual cardiologist".

Christians respond to injustice from different perspectives.





1. Forgiveness is unjust.

- The unpaid debt was unjust.
- Forgiving the servant was unjust.
- The parable is about the contrary nature of the kingdom's ethics.

Insight #1

We will have a hard time forgiving so long as we demand & expect justice.



Insight #2

This "broken" world provides the framework for the display of certain kingdom virtues like – grace, hope, courage, patience, and forgiveness.

It is not our circumstances but our response to them that is our witness to the gospel's hope. 7

Social justice plays an important role in the Scripture BUT:

Social injustice is like the pain that comes from a broken promise, body, or heart.

- The pain can and should be **alleviated** through pain killers (changing environment, etc.)
- But the pain also can be a **gift** pointing to a more serious underlying cause that will not be removed with pain killers.



Social injustice presents an opportunity to bear witness through compassion to the true hope of the Gospel.

Social justice plays an important role in the Scripture - BUT:

- ✓ Jesus was not a political zealot, nor were his disciples (1 Peter).
- ✓ The emphasis is on the social dynamics within the faith (Christian) community.
- Superficial social reform is like medicating the pain rather than the underlying cause.



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
Kingdom justice may start with pain killers but there is no expectation that they will address the root problems.

Jesus was clear in that his kingdom was not political, military, or economic.

John 18:36



2. Forgiveness is compassionate. *i*²⁷ And the lord of that slave felt compassion (Lk.15:20) and released him and forgave him the debt." Sympathy is understanding another's plight. Empathy is feeling what another feels so as to bring a passionate response. *i* Compassion is a willingness to relieve the suffering of another.

It has a broader perspective and takes into account timing and circumstances of events.
