The immediate context of Lk.13:6-9

Luke 13

"1 Now on the same occasion there were some present who reported to Him about the Galileans, whose blood Pilate had mingled with their sacrifices. 2 And He answered and said to them, "Do you suppose that these Galileans were greater sinners than all other Galileans, because they suffered this fate? 3 I tell you, no, but unless you repent, you will all likewise perish. 4 Or do you suppose that those eighteen on whom the tower in Siloam fell and killed them, were worse culprits than all the men who live in Jerusalem? 5 I tell you, no, but unless you repent, you will all likewise perish."

The immediate context of Lk.13:6-9

Luke 12:56

"You hypocrites! You know how to analyze the appearance of the earth and the sky, but why do you not analyze this present time?"

Luke 13:2

"Do you suppose that these Galileans were greater sinners than all other Galileans, because they suffered this fate?"

Luke 13:4

"Or do you suppose that those eighteen on whom the tower in Siloam fell and killed them, were worse culprits than all the men who live in Jerusalem?"

Luke 13:3

"I tell you, no, but unless you repent, you will all likewise perish."

Luke 13

6 And He began telling this parable: "A certain man had a fig tree which had been planted in his vineyard; and he came looking for fruit on it, and did not find any. 7 And he said to the vineyard-keeper, 'Behold, for three years I have come looking for fruit on this fig tree without finding any. Cut it down! Why does it even use up the ground?' 8 And he answered and said to him, 'Let it alone, sir, for this year too, until I dig around it and put in fertilizer; 9 and if it bears fruit next year, fine; but if not, cut it down."

THE POINT: Don't judge the meaning of life's circumstances too quickly.

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Observations on Lk.13:6-9

- The fig tree can symbolize Israel and / or individuals.
- The fruit can be receptive faith and / or a life that is virtuous.
- There are two differing opinions as to how to respond to the barren fig tree (Israel).
- Two possible points of this parable:
 - 1. Don't judge those who are not fruitful until you have nurtured them.
 - 2. The context suggests Don't judge the meaning of life's circumstances too quickly.

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Observations on Lk.13:6-9

Like the parable of the weeds in the wheat

Matthew 13

"27 And the slaves of the landowner came and said to him, 'Sir, did you not sow good seed in your field? How then does it have tares?' 28 And he said to them, 'An enemy has done this!' And the slaves said to him, 'Do you want us, then, to go and gather them up?' 29 But he said, 'No; lest while you are gathering up the tares, you may root up the wheat with them. 30 Allow both to grow together until the harvest; and in the time of the harvest I will say to the reapers, "First gather up the tares and bind them in bundles to burn them up; but gather the wheat into my barn.""

THE POINT: Don't judge the meaning of life's circumstances too quickly.

The application to Ancient Israel being cut off for unbelief.

Romans 9

"3 For I could wish that I myself were **accursed, separated from Christ** for the sake of my brethren, my kinsmen according to the flesh, 4 who are Israelites,"

Romans 11

"17 But if some of the branches were broken off, and you, being a wild olive, were grafted in among them and became partaker with them of the rich root of the olive tree, 18 do not be arrogant toward the branches; but if you are arrogant, remember that it is not you who supports the root, but the root supports you. 19 You will say then, "Branches were broken off so that I might be grafted in." 20 Quite right, they were broken off for their unbelief, but you stand by your faith. Do not be conceited, but fear; 21 for if God did not spare the natural branches, neither will He spare you."

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The application to the church

- √ Be slow to condemn those you do not first love and offer to help.
- ✓ Don't confess the sins of others until you have recognized and repented of your own sins.

Matthew 7:5

"You hypocrite, first take the log out of your own eye, and then you will see clearly to take the speck out of your brother's eye."


Romans 15

√ Recognize the tendency to wrongly label the spiritual significance of circumstances.






Recent U.S. presidents that some have believed to be "the Anti-Christ"



The application to historical events

- √ Recognize the tendency to wrongly label the spiritual significance of circumstances.
- ✓ Don't believe everything you hear from a so called "prophet" or a peddler of "fear".



√ Be a Berean - search the Scripture wisely.

2 Corinthians 12

"7 And because of the surpassing greatness of the revelations, for this reason, to keep me from exalting myself, there was given me a thorn in the flesh, a messenger of Satan to buffet me – to keep me from exalting myself! 8 Concerning this I entreated the Lord three times that it might depart from me. 9 And He has said to me, "My grace is sufficient for you, for power is perfected in weakness." Most gladly, therefore, I will rather boast about my weaknesses, that the power of Christ may dwell in me. 10 Therefore I am well content with weaknesses, with insults, with distresses, with persecutions, with difficulties, for Christ's sake; for when I am weak, then I am strong."

How could Paul have misunderstood his "thorn in the flesh"?

- √ It was Satan trying to stop Paul's ministry.

 "When in doubt, cast it out!"
- √ It was God's judgment on something wrong in Paul's life. "Do penance."
- ✓ It was a sign that Christian ministry was a "false call" for Paul. "He didn't have the gift."
- √ It was a call for more faith. "Persist in prayer."
- ✓ It was an indication that God's Word could not be trusted. "Chuck the faith."
- ✓ It was a sign that Jesus was not there, or did not care. "Try Buddha."

Romans 8

"20 For the creation was subjected to **futility**, not of its own will, but because of Him who subjected it, in hope 21 that the creation itself also will be set free from its slavery to **corruption** into the freedom of the glory of the children of God. 22 For we know that the whole creation **groans and suffers** the pains of childbirth together until now. 23 And not only this, but also we ourselves, having the first fruits of the Spirit, even we ourselves groan within ourselves, **waiting eagerly** for our adoption as sons, the redemption of our body."

- √ This is a reminder of our plight and our longing as part of a fallen world.
- √ We best not read more into this event.

This parable sheds light on how we might understand a social issue like homosexuality.

Romans 1,2

"32 and, although **they** know the ordinance of God, that those who practice such things are worthy of death, they not only do the same, but also give hearty approval to those who practice them. 1 Therefore you are without excuse, every man of you who passes judgment, for in that you judge another, you condemn yourself; for you who judge practice the same things." 22

Matthew 5:16

"Let your light shine before men in such a way that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father who is in heaven."

Ephesians 4:15

"but **speaking the truth in love**, we are to grow up in all aspects into Him, who is the head, even Christ."

Understanding the nature of our hope and calling.

- √ History is linear with a destiny and is coming to an end.
- ✓ Our ultimate hope is not to bring heaven to earth but to show & tell of heaven to the world.
- √ We do not know when this will happen but are to maintain stewardship of kingdom values.
- ✓ Natural disasters call for acts of God.
 - We cannot remove every bad circumstance.
 - But we can show compassion and self sacrifice in mitigating painful consequences and managing our environment.

✓ Our ultimate hope is in the coming king with his kingdom.

Titus 2
