The judgment of believers



Eternal judgment is among the elementary foundations of Christian faith.

Hebrews 6

"1 Therefore leaving the **elementary teaching** about the Christ, let us press on to maturity, not laying again a foundation of repentance from dead works and of faith toward God, 2 of instruction about washings, and laying on of hands, and the resurrection of the dead, and **eternal judgment**."

Romans 14

"10 But you, why do you judge your brother? Or you again, why do you regard your brother with contempt? For we shall all stand before the judgment seat of God. 11 For it is written, "As I live, says the Lord, every knee shall bow to Me, And every tongue shall give praise to God." 12 So then each one of us shall give account of himself to God."

2 Corinthians 5:10

"For we must all appear before the judgmentseat of Christ, that each one may be recompensed for his deeds in the body, according to what he has done, whether good or bad."

But aren't believers exempt?

John 5:24

"truly, truly, I say to you, he who hears My word, and believes Him who sent Me, has eternal life, and **does not come into judgment**, but has passed out of death into life."

1 Corinthians 1:18

"For the word of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved **it is the power of God**."

Yes, but what about

Romans 2

"6 who will render to each person according to his deeds: 7 to those who by perseverance in doing good seek for glory and honor and immortality, eternal life, 8 but to those who are selfishly ambitious and do not obey the truth, but obey unrighteousness, wrath and indignation."

"13 for it is not the hearers of the Law who are just before God, but the doers of the Law will be justified."

But in the next chapter Paul says:

Romans 3

"26 for the demonstration, I say, of His righteousness at the present time, so that He would be just and the justifier of the one who has faith in Jesus."

"28 For we maintain that a man is justified by faith apart from works of the Law."

Romans 4:5

"But to the one who does not work, but believes in Him who justifies the ungodly, his faith is credited as righteousness,"

But then again in ch.8 we read

Romans 8

"5... He condemned sin in the flesh, 4 in order that **the requirement of the Law might be fulfilled in us**, who do not walk according to the flesh, but according to the Spirit."

"12 So then, brethren, we are under obligation, not to the flesh, to live according to the flesh – 13 for if you are living according to the flesh, you must die; but if by the Spirit you are putting to death the deeds of the body, you will live."

Three observations

- 1. Paul is clear that Christians are justified by faith apart from works.
- 2. The Bible also teaches that all (including Christians) will be judged by works.
- 3. The Holy Spirit empowers us to live a godly life.

Three different explanations

- 1. Both observations are true & constitute a paradox.
- 2. True faith will produce the works required.
- 3. The judgment texts are misunderstood.
 - · Some of them are a part of a hypothetical argument.
 - · Some of them refer to rewards other than eternal life.

Three sources of hope at the final judgment

- 1. Dismissal Remove the standard of holiness so that there is no offense.
 - · A loving God would never condemn anyone.
- 2. Empowerment Enable believers to meet the standard by the power of the Holy Spirit.
 - •The Holy Spirit empowers true believers to fulfill the Law.
- 3. Redemption Fulfill the requirements FOR the believer (outside their personal behavior).
 - ·Jesus redeemed us from the curse of the Law.

Our hope in not in the Law or the Holy Spirit but in the Cross and Resurrection of Christ.

Hebrews 7:18-19


"For, on the one hand, there is a setting aside of a former commandment because of its weakness and uselessness (for the Law made nothing perfect), and on the other hand there is a bringing in of **a better hope**, through which we draw near to God."

Contrast

Our better hope is in Jesus' life and death FOR us not in the Law fulfilled THROUGH us by the Holy Spirit.



Don't confuse the ministries of the Law, the Son, and the Spirit.



Seven reasons why the texts concerning the judgment of Christians are misunderstood.

Logical reasons

- 1. Who can stand before the perfect standard of God's holy nature, even in the power of the Spirit?
- 2. How good must a person be and for how long?
- 3. In what sense is the Gospel good news if we are on parole?
- 4. How is this different from Judaism, or Roman Catholicism?

Theological reasons

- 5. Our Redeemer is Christ not the Holy Spirit?
- 6. In what sense did Christ fulfill the Law and we die to the Law?
- 7. How do we explain Paul's teaching of faith apart from works, and grace apart from personal merit?


Four common mistakes

If we are not practicing a perfectly holy life we do not go to heaven.



Because we are saved by grace it makes no difference how we live.

If we strive to be holy, God will accept us. Because God is merciful He will not judge anyone.



1 Corinthians 4

"3 But to me it is a very small thing that I should be examined by you, or by any human court; in fact, I do not even examine myself. 4 I am conscious of nothing against myself, yet I am not by this acquitted; but the one who examines me is the Lord. 5 Therefore do not go on passing judgment before the time, but wait until the Lord comes who will both bring to light the things hidden in the darkness and **disclose the motives of men's hearts**; and then each man's praise will come to him from God."

Disclosure of what was hidden is a part of the final judgment.

Revelation 21:4

"and **He will wipe away every tear from their eyes**; and there will no longer be any death; there will no longer be any mourning, or crying, or pain; the first things have passed away."

In the end there will be tears but they will be wiped away.

Luke 19:11-27

- "24 Then he said to the bystanders, "Take the mina away from him and give it to the one who has the ten minas."
- "27 But these enemies of mine, who did not want me to reign over them, bring them here and slay them in my presence."
- 1. There are two groups in this story slaves who serve the master (to varying degrees) & enemies.
- 2. The "worthless slave" loses his reward but is not destroyed with the "enemies" of the master.

1 Corinthians 3

"10 According to the grace of God which was given to me, like a wise master builder I laid a foundation, and another is building on it. But each man must be careful how he builds on it. 11 For no man can lay a foundation other than the one which is laid, which is Jesus Christ. 12 Now if any man **builds upon the foundation** with gold, silver, precious stones, wood, hay, straw, 13 each man's work will become evident; for the day will show it, because it is to be revealed with fire; and the fire itself will test the quality of each man's work."

How we build on our saving faith is the issue.

"14 If any man's work which he has built upon it remains, he shall **receive a reward**. 15 If any man's work is burned up, he shall **suffer loss**; but **he himself shall be saved**, yet so as through fire."

Reward and loss (not salvation) is the result of the believer's judgment.
