Does it make sense? Is it Biblical? Does it matter?

The case against the Trinity doctrine.

- 1. The word "trinity" does not appear in the Bible.
- 2. Those who teach the doctrine admit it is a mystery.
- 3. It is not reasonable.
- 4. It is not known to the writers of the OT or NT.
- 5. It is dated about 350 years after Christ.
- 6. The Jesus of the Gospels was not equal with the Father.
 - Mk.13:32 Only the Father knows some things.
 - Lk.22:41-42 Jesus prays to the Father.
 - Jn.14:28 "the Father is greater than I"
 - Jn.20:17 "My God"
 - 1 Cor.11:3 God is still the head of Christ.
 - 1 Cor.15:28 The Son is still subject to God.

1 Timothy 2:5

"For there is one God, and one mediator also between God and men, the man Christ Jesus,"

7. By definition Jesus could not be God.

God is not visible.

Jesus was visible.

· God is not changeable. Jesus changed forms.

God is not a man.

Jesus was a man.

God is not physical.

Jesus was flesh and bones.

· God submits to no one. Jesus submitted to God.

God is not mortal.

Jesus died.

God cannot sin.

Jesus became sin for others.

· God cannot be tempted. Jesus was tempted.

God is all-powerful.

Jesus couldn't carry the cross.

· God is everywhere.

Jesus lived in space & time.

· God is all knowing.

Jesus learned.

· God is tireless.

Jesus slept.

8. The texts used to support the Trinity can be answered.

- Jn.10:30 "I and My Father are one" (In Jn.17:22 "... that they may all be one just as we are one.")
- Jn.1:1 "The Word was God" ("with God', "no one has seen God" vs.18)
- 1.In.5:6-8 "There are three that bear witness, the Father. the Word, and the Holy Spirit." (these words are found in texts only after the 16th century).
- Matt.28:19 "in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit" (all records of baptisms in the early church are in the name of "Jesus" - Acts 2:38, 8:15, 10:48, 19:5)

9. The origin of the Trinity can be traced to other sources.

- a. Babylonian trinity Venus, moon, sun
- b. Hindu trinity Brahma, Vishnu, Shiva
- c. Greek trinity Zeus, Athena, Apollo
- d. Roman trinity Jupiter, Mercury, Venus

Why do Christians believe this?

Matt.28:19

"Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name (singular) of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit".

1. It is a clear deduction from Scripture.

1. There is but one God.

Deut.6:4 "Hear, O Israel! The Lord is our God, the Lord is one!"; **1 Tim.2:5** "For there is one God, and one mediator also between God and men, the man Christ Jesus,"

2. There are suggestions that God is plurality.

Gen.1:26 "Then God said, 'Let Us make man in Our image", Isa.6:8 "Then I heard the voice of the Lord, saying, 'Whom shall I send, and who will go for Us?"

3. There are suggestions that God is tri-unity.

Isa.48:12,16 "Listen to Me, O Jacob, even Israel whom I called; I am He, I am the first, I am also the last . . . And now the Lord God has sent Me, and His Spirit."

Matt.28:19 "baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit."

4. The Holy Spirit is described as God.

- ACTS 5:3,4 "lie to the H.S." "not to men, but to God"
- 2 Cor.3:17,18 "Now the Lord is the Spirit"

5. Jesus is described as God.

- Jn.1:1 "and the Word was God"
- Jn.1:18 "the only begotten God"
- Jn.20:28 "my Lord and my God"
- Titus 2:13 "of our God and Savior Jesus Christ"

He claimed to possess what properly belongs only to God.

- "his angels" Matt.13:41;
- "his kingdom" Matt.12:28;
- "his elect" Mk.13:20;
- power to forgive sins Mk.2:8-10


Jesus is equated with the YHWH of the Old Testament.




Philippians 2

It is easier to misrepresent the Godhead than to express the Trinity accurately.









My personal practice
