


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Numbers 31

"1 The LORD said to Moses, 2 Take vengeance on the Midianites for the Israelites. After that, you will be gathered to your people.' . . . 7 They fought against Midian, as the LORD commanded Moses, and killed every man. . . . 9 The Israelites captured the Midianite women and children and took all the Midianite herds, flocks and goods as **plunder**. . . . 15 'Have you allowed all the women to live?' he (Moses) asked them. 16 They were the ones who followed Balaam's advice and were the means of turning the Israelites away from the LORD in what happened at Peor, so that a plague struck the LORD's people. 17 Now kill all the boys. And kill every woman who has slept with a man, 18 but save for yourselves every girl who has never slept with a man."





The New Testament

Galatians 1:8 "But though we, or an angel from heaven, preach any other gospel unto you than that which we have preached unto you, let him be **accursed**."



A popular misconception #2 Biblical words picture God as a "diabolical, insecure, bully.

Nahum 1:2

"A **jealous** and **avenging** God is the Lord; The Lord is **avenging** and **wrathful**. The Lord takes **vengeance** on His adversaries, and He reserves **wrath** for His enemies."

Deuteronomy 20

Luke 24

"45 Then He opened their minds to understand the Scriptures, 46 and He said to them, Thus it is written, that **the Christ would suffer** and rise again from the dead the third day. 47 and that repentance for forgiveness of sins would be proclaimed in His name to all nations."

Three mistakes that many Christians make in reading the Old Testament.

- 1. Neglecting the literary context.
- 2. Neglecting the cultural context.
- 3. Neglecting the theological context.



To process the "harshness" of many O.T. passages we must respect three things.

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- The nature of God (like redemption) does not change but its fullness may be revealed gradually over time.
 - We should NOT read the Bible as an encyclopedia of "proof texts".
 - Read the Bible as a tutorial in and an unfolding revelation of theology.
 - We make a mistake when we read the O.T. as we do the N.T. Epistles - as though it all was written TO us or ABOUT us.
 - Bereans must know what grade level of the Biblical theology they are reading.

We read the Bible through cultural lenses. Gospels Epistles Modern Western culture Old Testament

The same "wrathful" language is used to describe the fate of Messiah

Isaiah 53

"4 Surely he took up our infirmities and carried our sorrows, yet we considered him **stricken by God, smitten by him**, and afflicted. 5 But he was **pierced** for our transgressions, he was **crushed** for our iniquities; the **punishment** that brought us peace was upon him, and by his wounds we are healed. 6... the LORD has laid on him the iniquity of us all. ... 12... For he bore the sin of many, and made intercession for the transgressors."

Luke 24:26

"Was it not necessary for the Christ to suffer these things and to enter into His glory?"

To process the "harshness" of many O.T. passages we must respect three things.

- 3. Reading Joshua, Judges, Imprecatory psalms, etc. should make us uncomfortable.

Romans 1:18

"For the wrath of God is revealed from heaven against all ungodliness and unrighteousness of men, who suppress the truth in unrighteousness,"

A rejection of the harshness of O.T. ethics may reflect a bias:

Not so much for Jesus' teaching as it does for Western culture

and a disrespect for the "word of the cross".

1 Corinthians 1:18

"For the **word of the cross** is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God."

Steps to Biblical Moral Wisdom

- 1. Understand the **NATURE** of our dignity and depravity - Gen.1-11
- 2. Understand the **PROMISE** in God's plan to restore us - Gen.12-17
- 3. Making sure we see the **SERIOUSNESS** of our problem - Ex. - Deut.
- 4. Making sure we see God's SAVIOR for our problem - Gospels
- 5. Making sure we see the SOLUTION to our problem - Epistles

NOTE: The Law of Moses was specific in prescribing the death penalty for:

- A foreigner too close to the tabernacle
- Sacrificing to gods other than YHWH
- Worshiping false gods
- False prophecy
- Blasphemy
- · Sabbath breaking
- Premarital sex
- · Homosexual acts
- Prostitution
- Smiting a parent
- Cursing a parent
- Persists in disobeving parents





Jesus speaks as one living under that Law of Moses (Old Covenant)

Matthew 5

"17 Do not think that I came to abolish the Law or the Prophets; I did not come to abolish, but to fulfill. 18 For truly I say to you, until heaven and earth pass away, not the smallest letter or stroke shall pass away from the Law, until all is accomplished. 19 Whoever then annuls one of the least of these commandments, and so teaches others, shall be called least in the kingdom of heaven; but whoever keeps and teaches them, he shall be called great in the kingdom of heaven. 20 For I say to you, that unless your righteousness surpasses that of the scribes and Pharisees, you shall not enter the kingdom of heaven."

Jesus spoke of God's wrath.

Matthew 5:22

"But I say to you that everyone who is angry with his brother shall be guilty before the court; and whoever shall say to his brother, 'Raca,' shall be guilty before the supreme court; and whoever shall say, 'You fool,' shall be guilty enough to go into the fiery hell."

(Matthew 5:29, 10:28, 18:9, 23:15,33, 25:41)

Matthew 25:41

"Then He will also say to those on His left, 'Depart from Me, accursed ones, into the eternal fire which has been prepared for the devil and his angels;"

In the Sermon on the Mount Jesus made it clear that the Mosaic Law asked for a level of holiness that should make everyone uncomfortable.

Jesus equated "anger" with "murder" Matt.5:22 Jesus equated "lust" with "adultery" Matt.5:28

Matthew 5

"29 And if your right eye makes you stumble, tear it out, and throw it from you; for it is better for you that one of the parts of your body perish, than for your whole body to be thrown into hell. 30 And if your right hand makes you stumble, cut it off, and throw it from you; for it is better for you that one of the parts of your body perish, than for your whole body to go into hell."

2 Timothy 2:15


"Be diligent to present yourself approved to God as a workman who does not need to be ashamed, handling accurately the word of truth."

"Humble Harmonization"

- 1. It sees "as in a mirror dimly" 1 Cor.13:12
- It best (not perfectly) explains all the data
 It is willing to admit, "we don't know it all"
 It majors on majors not minors
- 5. It punctuates its affirmations with (! - . ?)

"Contextual sensitivity"

- 1. Our culture may hinder our objectivity
- 2. God reveals Himself progressively
- 3. Gen.1-3 truths are to be taken very seriously
- 4. We are to read like adults not children
