


What does it mean to be human?



The O.C. and N.C. teach the same message with respect to the God / Man relationship.

Holiness

(holy, saint, sanctify, sanctuary) "to be set apart to God"

Bearing the image of God is the essence of Holiness.



O.C. disciples of Jesus wanted to know:

- 1. The mystery of Election Who is the true Israel or the chosen people of God?
- 2. The mystery of Holiness How could a holy and just God justify Gentile sinners without the Law and its temple sacrifices?
- 3. The mystery of the Cross How could a crucified Messiah save God's elect people?



The Apostles address these issues in the N.C. Epistles.

Holiness was at the core of the Old Covenant's theology

Matthew 5

"17 Do not think that I came to abolish the Law or the Prophets; I did not come to abolish, but to fulfill. 18 For truly I say to you, until heaven and earth pass away, not the smallest letter or stroke shall pass away from the Law, until all is accomplished. 19 Whoever then annuls one of the least of these commandments, and so teaches others, shall be called least in the kingdom of heaven; but whoever keeps and teaches them, he shall be called great in the kingdom of heaven. 20 For I say to you, that unless your righteousness surpasses that of the scribes and Pharisees, you shall not enter the kingdom of heaven."

The path to holiness was the Law.

Paul's commentary on Jesus' teaching -"We have a problem!"

Romans 3:23 "For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God." The O.C. and N.C. differ with respect to how to acquire the holiness that God demands.

Imputation


- The attribution of a value to something that ordinarily does not have that value.
- To "consider" or "see as" so. (It is a mental construct rather than an experiential reality).





The temple priest was ceremonially sanctified with water before he performed his sacred duties.

Position is about facts and faith.

Four kinds of righteousness (holiness)

1. The righteousness of God This is the perfect, holy, character of God.


2. The righteousness of faith This is the imputed holiness of Christ.


3. The righteousness of the Spirit This is the fruit of the Spirit in this life.

4. The "righteousness" of the flesh This is the superficial holiness of man.

 The Corinthian church ✓ "To the church of God which is at Corinth, to those who have been sanctified in Christ Jesus, saints by calling" 1 Corinthians 1:2 ✓ "for you are still fleshly. For since there is jealously and strife among you, are you not fleshly, and are you not walking like mere men." 1 Corinthians 3:3 	 Summary Perfect holiness (reflecting the image of God) is demanded of all who would participate in God's kingdom. We are incapable of that holiness apart from the imputation of Christ's righteousness to our account through faith. The imputed righteousness of Christ is reckoned to our account as though we were perfect even when we are experientially imperfect. This is the good news of the Gospel that is symbolized in our baptism and is the basis of our confidence before God.

Is God there, is He fair, & does He care?

- 1. We are all created in the image of God.
- 2. We are all responsible to be true to ourselves as image bearers.
- 3. We are all **frustrated** by the brokenness of ourselves and our world.
- 4. Jesus is sent as a gift of grace to (among other things) impute His righteousness to us by faith.
- 5. Many have received Christ by faith so as to stand before God as a perfect image bearer in Christ.
- 6. Many others have chosen to stand before God on their own merit.
- 7. God will be perfectly fair in His judgment of both.

No one is forced to receive Christ but all must bear God's image to be reconciled to Him!
