Roman Catholicism vs. Reformers

The Reformed notion of sacred vocation grew out of a reaction to the spiritual class system in the Roman Catholic church.

Three cautions with respect to vocational calling?

- 1. The notion of secular "sacred" vocation is hard to find in the Bible.
- 2. The notion of secular "sacred" vocation tends to put the emphasis on vocation rather than why and how the work is carried out.
- 3. Most people in the world have little choice about their vocational work but real choice as to why and how they do their job.

We must learn to bring the Sabbath to our work.

We do this by not worshiping our work but worshiping God in it.

We cannot let work take a Messianic role in our lives.

- 2. The person who is not an aggressive investor loses what he tries to protect.
- 3. The person with the power to invest is the servant-steward of another's stuff.

"God created man in His own image"




We are created to display the image of God in the earth.

Care-taking

- √ This mandate focuses on our responsibility to nature.
- √ It views the creation as existing for the support of human life (not vice versa).
- √ The mandate is to cultivate, conserve, and consume (but not to worship or abuse) nature.

Genesis 1

"27 God created man in His own image, in the image of God He created him; male and female He created them. 28 God blessed them; and God said to them, "Be fruitful and multiply, and fill the earth, and subdue it; and rule over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the sky and over every living thing that moves on the earth." 29 Then God said, "Behold, I have given you every plant yielding seed that is on the surface of all the earth, and every tree which has fruit yielding seed; it shall be food for you;"

Genesis 2:15

"Then the Lord God took the man and put him into the garden of Eden to **cultivate** it and **keep** it."

Care-taking (implications)

- **√** Humans are not intruders in nature.
- √ Do not worship nature or abuse it.
- ✓ Do not be afraid to harness and harvest natural resources.
- √ The natural world is very durable but also merciless when disrespected.
- ✓ Animal life was to be respected but also used for food, sacrifice, etc.

Proverbs 12:10

"A righteous man has regard for the life of his animal,"

Luke 12:6

"Are not five sparrows sold for two cents? Yet **not one of them is forgotten** before God."

Exodus 23:11-12

A Sabbath rest was **extended to animals** and every seventh year the land was to "rest and lie fallow."

Jonah 4:11

"Should I not have compassion on Nineveh, the great city in which there are more than 120,000 persons who do not know the difference between their right and left hand, as well as many animals?"

Care-giving

- ▼ This mandate focuses on our responsibility to other humans.
- √ Humans are social beings.
- This mandate has to do with social responsibilities and expectations.
 (Human rights, civil government & discourse, biological family, etc.)
- ✓ Social justice (care for the poor and powerless) is a major theme in Scripture.

Genesis 4

"9 Then the Lord said to Cain, "Where is Abel your brother?" And he said, "I do not know. **Am I my brother's keeper?**" 10 He said, "What have you done? The voice of your brother's blood is crying to Me from the ground."

Galatians 6:10

"So then, while we have opportunity, let us **do good to all people**, and especially to those who are of the household of the faith."

Care-giving (implications)

- √ Healthy families and communities are vital to the general welfare of all.
- √ We are to care for others without carrying others or seeing them as the source of our life.
- ✓ Our true strength is measured by our cooperation, and compassion more than our competition.

Covenant keeping

- ▼ This mandate focuses on our responsibility to be a light to the world as God's people.
- ✓ Our baptism initiates our covenant participation with Christ.
- √ The Lord's table renews our covenant promise.

1 Peter 2

"9 But you are a **chosen race**, a **royal priesthood**, a **holy nation**, a **people for** *God's* **own possession**, so that you may proclaim the excellencies of Him who has called you out of darkness into His marvelous light; 10 for you once were not a people, but now you are **the people of God**; you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy."

Covenant Keeping (implications)

- √ We are Christ's representative ambassadors in this life.
- √ We are stewards of the Gospel (the message of hope) to our world.
- ✓ Our agenda as God's people is focused on the story we share and the community we show.

Character Building

- This mandate focuses on the responsibility of God's people to develop and demonstrate the character of God.
- √ It is the major emphasis of the Biblical call on God's people.

1 Peter 1:16
"You shall be holy,
for I am holy."

Godly character is

The heart of Christ reproduced in the believer by the indwelling Spirit in obedient response to God's Word.

The Bible "teaches to the test."



It emphasizes what is most important - what we really need to know.

What is God's stuff?

- 2. Covenant keeping. (show and tell)
 - 3. Character building.



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
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Ephesians 4

- √ This mandate focuses on human responsibility to make disciples.
- This is a major part of the Covenant mandate and a big emphasis in Scripture.
- ✓ World evangelism is the first step in the process but not the end or focus of it.

Great Commission (implications)

- ✓ We have a story to share the Gospel.
- ✓ We are not all evangelists but we are witnesses to the living Christ in what we do and say.
- √ The world's hope rests with us as we show and tell the good news.

God's Community

- √ This mandate focuses on the responsibility of God's people to use their unique abilities to serve God's purposes as part of Christ's Body.
- √ Key aspects of this mandate are focus, boundaries, assertiveness, and coordination.
- √ The proper use of gifts demands a proper view of and commitment to a spiritual community.

Community (implications)

- ✓ Christians are called to a holy team The Body of Christ.
- ✓ We need each other in order to grow, prosper, & minister.
- √ Like parts of the biological body we have special functions that work in coordination with other parts.
- √ Learn to get along, love, appreciate.
