


Mistakes that both Liberals and Conservatives tend to make.

- ✓ Respecting only the data that fits the desired conclusion.
- ✓ Failing to respect the power of assumptions and presuppositions.
- ✓ Demanding a level of certainty that is unrealistic.
- ✓ Placing too much confidence in modern views of truth.

Science is like a large mesh net.


It is limited in what kind of truth it can catch.

Assumptions of the Liberal Historical Critic.

- ✓ The supernatural or "God factor" is not something the historian can identify.
- ✓ Only natural historical explanations are permitted.
- ✓ There is no truth beyond what can be explained naturally.
- ✓ We must explain everything naturally even if we have to use imaginary data or distort the hard data.

I Corinthians 1:20-21

- ✓ Late words


How do Conservatives understand the formation of the Old Testament?

- ✓ The Jews (including Jesus) accepted as authoritative a text that has been passed down to us by the Masaretes (Scribes of the 5th to 11th cent.)
- ✓ The Dead Sea Scrolls indicated that the text had been faithfully preserved.
- ✓ There is little information on how the Hebrews came to recognize their inspired texts.

The Exodus



... a series of texts over time by unknown sources (J,E,D,&P).

The Historical Critical explanation of the Old Testament.

✓ It is generally assumed that the three divisions of the Hebrew Bible represent three periods of writing.

Pentateuch - Prophets - Writings

- √ The Pentateuch was written by 4 sources.
 - J 850 Jehovah (works through people)
 - E 750 Elohim (works through miracles)
 - D 621 Deuteronomy
 - P 500 Priestly emphasis over the Prophets

Genesis 21


"1 Then the LORD took note of Sarah as He had said, and the LORD did for Sarah as He had promised. 2 So Sarah conceived and bore a son to Abraham in his old age, at the appointed time of which God had spoken to him. 3 Abraham called the name of his son who was born to him, whom Sarah bore to him, Isaac. 4 Then Abraham circumcised his son Isaac when he was eight days old, as God had commanded him. 5 Now Abraham was one hundred years old when his son Isaac was born to him. 6 Sarah said, ""God has made laughter for me; everyone who hears will laugh with me." 7 And she said, ""Who would have said to Abraham that Sarah would nurse children? 
- ✓ The Scriptural testimony Ex.17:14;

How do evangelical Christians understand the origin of the N.T.

- ✓ The NT documents were identified fairly soon after they were written as inspired by God's Spirit through Apostles or their close associates.
- ✓ The N.T makes claims inspiration.
 - II Tim.3:16-17 "All Scripture is inspired by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, for training in righteousness; that the man of God may be adequate, equipped for every good work."

The historical Jesus . . .


... became the Christ of faith . . .

in the Gospels.

We know very little about Jesus.

There were competing Imaginations of Jesus Christ in the early church.

The Gospels were written to support the theology of the early church.



II Peter 1:16

"We did not follow cleverly invented stories when we told you about the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but we were eyewitnesses of his majesty."

The weaknesses of the Historical Critical method.

- ✓ It is an infant "creative" science.
 - ✓ It is influenced by fads.
 - ✓ It has a poor track record.
- ✓ Its presuppositions are too restrictive.
 - ✓ It refuses to admit its own bias.
 - ✓ It make too much of too little.
 - ✓ It wants to have its cake and eat it to.

"It is not merely that the Bible isn't read from the perspective of faith, it isn't even read from the perspective of the possibility of faith." To make matters even more difficult for those of faith, many institutions of higher learning aggressively socialize students with unqualified or justified pressure from expressions like, "obviously," "of course," "everyone now knows," "all scholars agree that."

The Da Vinci Code Where is it inaccurate?

- ✓ The role of Constantine in shaping Christianity is fictitious.
- √ The Church did not suppress false gospels.
- Gnostic gospels were late and had little impact on Christianity.
- ✓ Mary as the bride of Jesus is without any historical merit.

The Jesus Seminar What do we know about the historical Jesus?

- ✓ If a statement has a parallel outside the Gospels it could not be of Jesus. It was imported as past Jewish culture.
- ✓ If a statement seems to support a unique Christian doctrine it could not be of Jesus. It was imported as propaganda.
- ✓ If a statement is supernatural it could not be true. Miracles were the imagination of the early church in its desire to create a Christ figure.
- ✓ If a statement is found in only one source or inconsistent with the culture it could not be of Jesus.

Luke 11:52

"Woe to you experts in the law, because you have taken away the key to knowledge. You yourselves have not entered, and you have hindered those who were entering."

It is reasonable to believe the N.T. writers were speaking the truth.

- ✓ They included embarrassing details about themselves.
- ✓ They included embarrassing details and difficult saying of Jesus.
- ✓ They left in demanding saying of Jesus.
- ✓ They distinguished Jesus' words form their own.
- ✓ They included events related to the resurrection that they would not have invented.
- ✓ They challenge their readers to check their facts.
- ✓ They describe miracles as historical events.
- ✓ They abandoned their long-held beliefs to follow their message.

The unnatural origin of Christianity.

- ✓ Its origin is dramatic, fast and certain (not evolved).
- ✓ The doctrine of the resurrection was established early.
- ✓ It started in an obscure corner of the Roman empire.
- Jesus' ministry was short, local, and without writing.
- ✓ The hostility against Christianity was unusual in Rome.
- ✓ It was dangerous to be a Christian.

Big questions for critics!

How honest and secure are you in your conclusions?

How do you explain the "resurrection of Jesus"?

What basis for your soul's hope do you have that is better or more certain?

What should be our posture toward Liberal Historical Critical challenges?

- ✓ Be informed. Get your facts straight.
- ✓ Be humble. Don't be afraid to admit you don't have all the answers.
- ✓ Be reasonable. Recognize where you have a point to make and where they may have a valid point.
- ✓ Don't demand too much. Realize that faith does not demand absolute certainty but reasonable probability.
